# Background

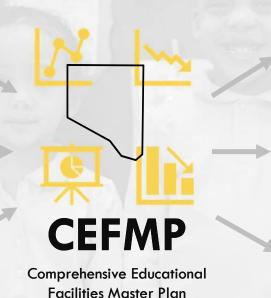
- FY2023-28 Capital Improvement Program (CIP):
  - ✓ Provides a six-year plan that identifies public school construction needs and establishes a reasonable schedule for funding and implementing projects
  - ✓ Consists of requests for the budget year (FY2023), and anticipated requests for the following five years (FY2024-28)
  - ✓ Submitted to the Interagency Commission on Public School Construction (IAC)
  - ✓ Contains projects proposed to address capacity, to support the implementation of an educational initiative, to improve building performance, and/or to address facility priorities

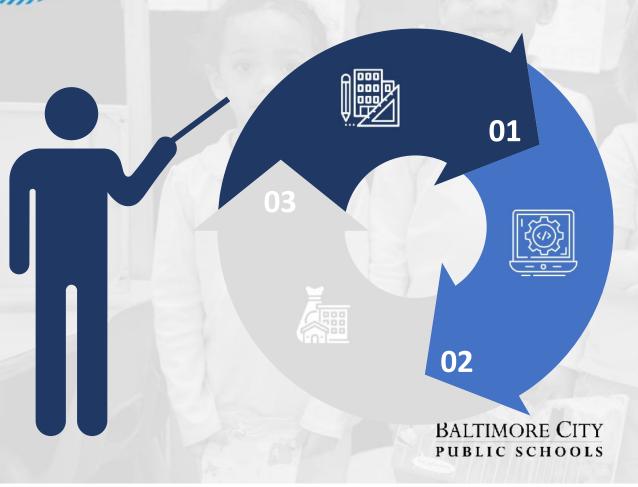
Annual Review of Schools in Portfolio



City Schools' Capital Improvement Program (CIP) provides the budget, schedule and plan for the operational development of our educational facilities to support the overall educational programmatic and planning goals within City Schools' portfolio.

### **MAINTENANCE & CAPITAL INTERRELATONSHIP**

### **01** CAPITAL PROJECT

All buildings and major systems typically begin as capital projects. From these projects come Building Maintenance Plans (BMPs) and warranties that are provided at turnover to Facilities, Maintenance & Operations (FM&O) to inform maintenance practices over the lifecycle of the building and its systems.

### 02 MAINTENANCE PROGRAM

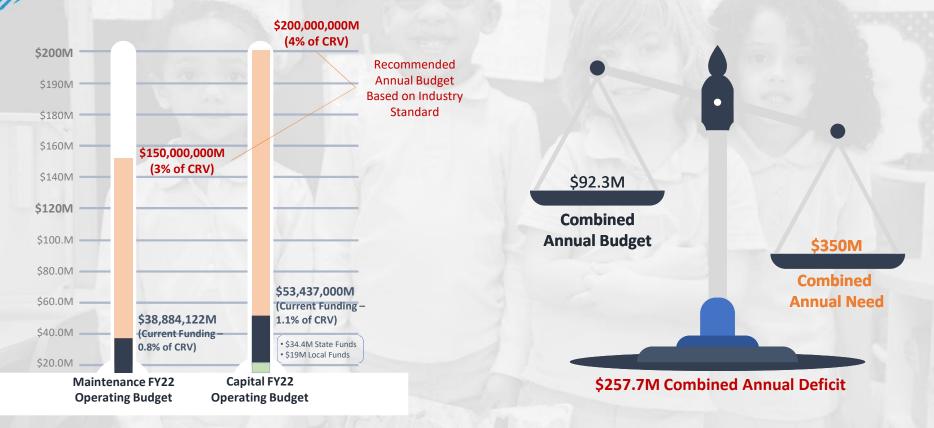
FM&O uses the BMP and warranty information to plan routine and preventive maintenance activities that control the effects of normal usage and deterioration of the building and its systems over its expected lifecycle. FM&O tracks these activities along with emergencies, minor and major repairs, replacements and upgrades. All maintenance activities are dictated by the operating budget.

### 03 CAPITAL RENEWAL

When a system is at the end of its lifecycle it should be presented for capital renewal considering all maintenance records and current physical condition. A repair may be presented for capital renewal when the scope of work extends beyond keeping the asset working.

## **CIP FY2023: Recommendation**

- The Office of the Chief Operating Officer recommends approval on the FY2023-28 CIP. The FY2023 CIP state request is for \$54M for 22 projects. The approval of the CIP will provide funding to some of the many needed school construction projects in Baltimore City.
- Note: The 102.4 Form, dated 9/14/21, is subject to revisions per additional prioritization and costs analyses.

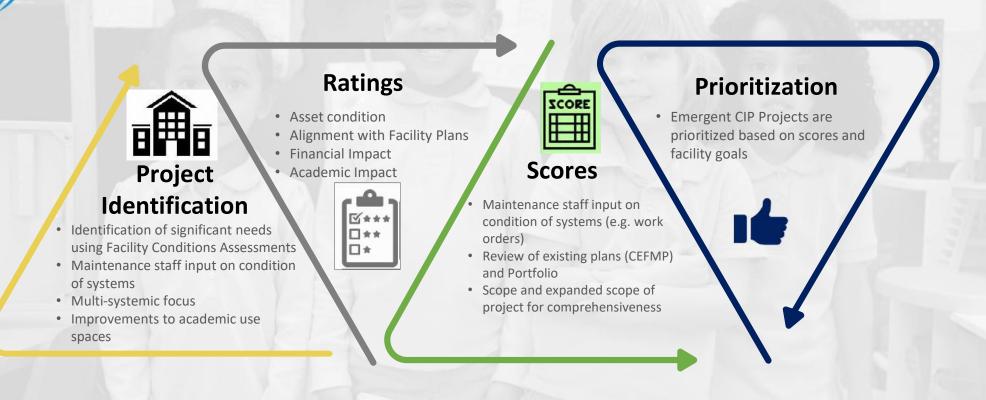

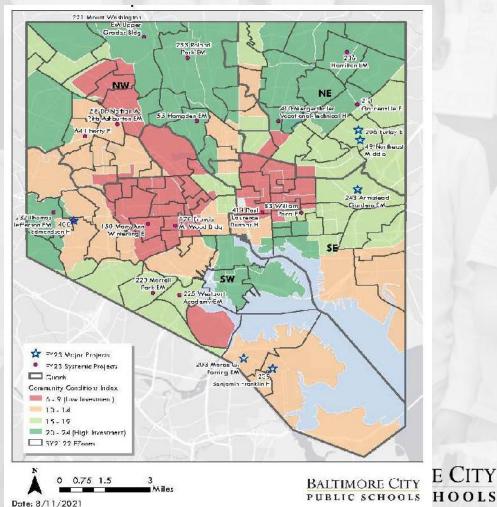

# **Local Allocation Expenditures**

- Hard costs: Currently 4%
- Contingency costs 8% 10%
- A/E costs 8% 12% of the total (state and local)
- Construction Management fees 3% (large projects)
- Local initiative projects

- Unforeseen project costs
  - Hazardous material

# **Other Funding Programs**

### **SCHOOL SAFETY GRANT**

- HB 1783 to provide school security improvements
- \$20M allotted for all LEAs in two rounds
- Round 1 \$1M City Schools
   allocation
- Round 2 \$883k allocation; 142 access control system projects approved
- Improvements include secure and lockable classroom doors or areas, other security technology



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### \$15M HVAC FUNDS

- 2018 SB 186 to provide \$15M to City Schools over 7 years
- Held in reserve and not included in CIP allocation
- 18 projects approved
- Funds used for design, construction, and capital equipment of HVAC improvement

### **HEALTHY SCHOOL FACILITY**

- \$30M provided annually, not more than
   \$15M per LEA for FY2020
- For FY2022, legislatively guaranteed 50% of \$30M total allocation
- Funding separate from CIP
- Projects being submitted currently for HVAC, roofing, windows
- Approved projects require local match
